Conference of Presentation Sisters Conference Calls

Every few months the Justice Contacts of North America meet by conference call. This month we meet on the 22nd and in preparation for the call Virginia Wilkinson (New Windsor) our current chairperson developed a questionnaire to all the Justice Contacts to evaluate what we do and how we communicate with one another. The committee discussed the questions and the answers to be given by our group.

Faith Perspectives on Housing - Several Sisters from both the Leadership Team and the JPIC Committee have attended meetings on housing with a view to encouraging better housing opportunities for persons on a low-income.

Several of the NL delegates to the 2013 CHRA Congress in Ottawa got together to debrief the event and one issue that became a major focus for discussion was engagement of faith communities in housing issues. There have been two meetings, modeled on a venture in Toronto, which gathered a faith-based group in the city with the NL Home Builders Association, Canadian Housing & Renewal Association and City of St. John's Affordable Housing. Further meetings will be held organized by Scott Morton-Ninomiya and Bruce Pearce.

There is an increase in *Human Trafficking* world-wide. We need to be aware of what is happening around us which is so dangerous to human beings being moved from one country to another often illegally and always under false pretenses of available work which will help families living in desperate situations in two/third world countries.

Good News

The United Nations through the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) has supported the development of specific laws on the rights of indigenous peoples, which clarified the content of the principle of free, prior and informed consent of indigenous peoples in the Republic of Congo and Indonesia. It has also produced training modules and provided technical assistance and expert advice to ensure that national regulations' initiatives comply with existing international standards on free, prior and informed consent in countries such as Bolivia, Mexico, Peru and Ecuador. OHCHR has worked closely with the indigenous experts and United Nations agencies involved in the UN Indigenous Peoples' Partnership (UNIPP) to ensure that all UNIPP country programmes are not merely about indigenous peoples, but also designed and implemented in true partnership.
