Events and Actions of our JPIC committee:

Housing and Homelessness -

- Report on Home Builders Association meeting: Angela and Clo attended the HBA meeting at Holiday Inn on February 13th. The discussion focused on the lack of affordable housing in St. John's including the idea that for many people, there is truly no 'affordable' housing. Between 2006 and 2012 there was a 91% increase in the cost of housing in our city. Factors included cost of shipping materials, most money in the hands of few people, greed, etc. The good news is that there was a consensus at the meeting that good effective dialogue had begun and is crucial for positive action.
- Report on 'Faith and Housing' meeting: Angela, Clo and Emma attended this monthly meeting at St. Mark's Church on Feb. 19. Affordable housing is emerging as one of the most pressing issues in the City of St. John's. Bruce Pearce gave a presentation on the History of Housing and noted that in the 1950's and 1960's, our city was the envy of the rest of Canada with our affordable housing but again, because of many factors including the lack of government funding we are now on a par with Calgary in our lack of housing across the spectrum of affordability. It is recommended that through its Affordable Housing Action Plan, the City work with the private sector, and all levels of government and community organizations to focus on developing and promoting innovative and collaborative programs and policies that attempt to address the many issues surrounding the most vulnerable of our society.
- National JPIC Conference, May 2015: Our committee has been asked to coordinate the various Congregational Atlantic JPIC committees in preparing the opening evening liturgy of this conference.

don't have to leave your name, but we need to know. Otherwise, we can't deal with the problem," O'Keefe said.

Workshop on Human Trafficking

The Newfoundland Coalition Against Human Trafficking Conference will be held at the Capital Hotel from April 7-9, to raise awareness and to inform the community on ways to address this modern day form of slavery. Sister Emma sits on the organizing committee which is a multi-disciplinary group. The keynote speaker is Joyce Smith, MP from Manitoba. She has wide experience and is working with a national group to change laws which further re-victimize trafficked persons who are

fearful of any law officers, as often they are illegal immigrants and have no passports or other necessary documentation. Human trafficking is a global problem that has local implications for the people of Newfoundland and Labrador. The cost of registration is \$150.
