Congregational Leadership Team announcement of the Appointment of an International Animator for the Friends of Nano

In 1989 the Congregational Leadership Team (CLT) called the Sisters to collaborate with Laity as 'equal partners in our common mission'. In our last Congregational Gathering we committed to 'play a supportive role towards furthering the growth of the International *Friends of Nano* Movement'. Responding to that commitment and to a recommendation made by the previous CLT, we tried to create a salaried position and appoint an International Coordinator, but at the time none of the people recommended to us by Unit Leadership Teams was willing to take on the role.



In the last few months, Mary-Ann Greaney, New Zealand, who previously worked on an International Coordinating Committee for the *Friends of Nano*, became available to work with the *Friends of Nano* again. After conversations with Mary-Ann we have decided to appoint her as the International Animator for the *Friends of Nano* for three years, commencing on 1 October 2021. This is not a salaried position. This was Mary-Ann's decision. We have agreed to provide the expenses necessary to carry out the role till 2024.

The Role Description was written following conversations with Mary-Ann, it states that: The International Animator will focus on four main aims: Communication, Formation, the Promotion of the Movement among new and younger members, and the Promotion of Leadership. To enable her to do this, she will:

Familiarise herself with the *Friends of Nano* in each Unit Community of the Congregation
Gather a Multicultural Team to work with her, in moving the *Friends of Nano* towards becoming a co-responsible and sustainable Movement, who share the vision and charism of Nano Nagle and who collaborate with the Presentation Congregation in finding creative ways to further the Mission.

3) Promote creative ways of supporting the ongoing formation of each local group of the *Friends of Nano*.

4) Promote creative ways of attracting new members especially among the younger generation.

5) Continue the development of good communication across the Movement.

6) Promote the development of a pool of leaders who will be willing to take on leadership roles in the future.

We trust that each of you in your various *Friends of Nano* groups will give Mary-Ann all the support she needs from you. We are deeply grateful to Mary-Ann for her willingness to say 'Yes' to becoming the International Animator for the *Friends of Nano* and for the graciousness and enthusiasm with which she is embracing her new role.

The human face of Covid-19 in Chile



Since the Covid 19 pandemic began, Chile has lost 37,493 people of different ages. Today with 80% of the population vaccinated and following the protocol dictated by the World Health Organization (WHO), the guarantine has been lifted in almost

the entire country along with the curfew. Restaurants, bars and businesses in general are slowly beginning to open their doors.

Among the deceased is Don Waldo Zelada, 68 years old, who had no underlying disease. Don Waldo was a friendly taxi driver whom I contacted when my family and I moved from Iquique to Quillota in the middle of

the pandemic, October 2020. This kind and generous man transferred us from the airport to this small city, welcoming us, wishing us well and hoping that we would feel comfortable in his city. He guided us and told us where we could buy cheaper food and anything we might need.

During the suffocating heat of January, when the use of the mask was unbearable, Don Waldo took us to the outskirts of the city, to a beautiful area in the countryside, a wonderful grove where we enjoyed the landscape. We took off our masks and breathed clean air and we saw the vegetable plantations in the valley - a gift in the midst of a pandemic. Don had several clients and was very careful with the health protocol, but at the end

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of May he stopped answering his cell phone. We thought that perhaps he was very busy with his clientele, but in August another driver informed us that Don had died due to Covid and they did not know how he got infected. For my family, he was a beautiful person, one of those helpers that God sends us. Thank you, Don Waldo Zelada!

The health personnel have worked with great strength and dedication to save lives. Ignacio Marin, 26, is a young doctor and was part of the Valparaíso Hospital team that tirelessly fought against COVID 19. His mother Carmen Gloria told me about him, when I met her at her business. She told me how very worried she was as she had not seen her son for more than a year due to Covid. He only communicated by cell phone, because he did not want to expose her to the virus. But she feared for him, as his shifts were long and exhausting. Recently Ignacio told her, "I have never seen so much suffering."



Her maternal fears materialized when Ignacio told her that he felt very stressed, tired, exhausted, that more than a year

rescuing people from a ruthless virus left him totally without energy. She was worried about his capacity to cope. On the digital page of the *Friends of Nano* a prayer request was made for the young doctor.

Two weeks later I met Carmen Gloria, her eyes shining with joy, and even though she was masked, I could imagine her smile as she told me,

"Soon I will see my son!" They had transferred him to the maternity area of the hospital, where life is born together with hope. I smile and say to heaven "Thank you, Nano".

season. The project was launched in May 2021.



Sadhguru's reflection resonates with our core value of a **Covenant with Creation** and sends a powerful message of the need to collaborate in any way we can with the U.N. climate change summit, **COP26**. The climate change summit is set to begin in Glasgow, Scotland on 31 October through to 12 November. Some 20,000 delegates are expected from all over the world. We may not be able to attend in person but we can hold all the decision makers in prayer.

The impact of being a Friend of Nano is one of the best kept secrets in the Presentation world. Very often the ministries we are involved in are invisible as we go quietly about making a difference in the lives of people. Many Friends of Nano have changed their priorities and refocused on the things they are involved in after reflecting on Nano or meeting others in the Presentation family. For some the transformation has been dramatic and others a more gradual process. Friends of Nano in New Zealand, Pakistan, South India, and the USA, share a few insights on how knowing Nano motivates all they do.

Taking Nano's influence into daily life

Recently I have become a volunteer at Invercargill prison It took me back to the day I became an Associate of New Zealand working with prisoners on a program called Nano Nagle, where in my statement I vowed to carry "Seasons for Growth". The aim of the program is to assist prisoners dealing with grief and loss, enabling them to make better choices and decisions when released.

Prior to commencing, we were invited to attend an interdenominational service on Saturdays with the aim of building rapport and trust with the men. I was "blown away" with the way the majority participated with music, readings and sharing of personal testimonies which were often lives of abuse, little support or love.

Volunteers were asked to introduce themselves, share a little about themselves and what had brought them there. While working out what I was going to say, I found myself reflecting on the journey of my own life and the people who had guided me along the way.

A Story of Transformation

Though all the people who joined the movement certainly caught the spark of Nano Nagle's charism and have been transformed by it, one of the greatest examples of transformation based on inspiration by the



life of Nano in Jhelum, Pakistan is Mrs Shumaila Pervez. As a newly-married teacher from D.I Khan who joined the Presentation Convent Jhelum in 1988, she heard the life history of the venerable Nano Nagle and got inspired to change her own priorities, as Nano had. She started helping those students who were weak in

studies, and visited needy families with the Presentation Sisters. One of the pioneers in her group, she is still an active member of the Friends of Nano in Jhelum. She

Nano's influence into my daily life. I didn't realize it then, but her influence had already begun as a first day pupil in 1950 at St. Peters Chanel school in Green Island New Zealand. I was taught by The Presentation Sisters who had recently arrived from Ireland. They instilled in me


enthusiastic that after her retirement in December 2021. she will devote herself to the service of her community.

Transformation - A human response to a Divine experience

Prazeres Gonsalves, a Friend of Nano since 2019, is from Verem, Goa. He has organised awareness programmes for people to keep bees, shift to Solar Energy and other sustainable living practices. He found creative ways to live with them even during the pandemic

Being a keen reflective observer, he notices things when done differently. He noticed our circular seating arrangement and values the fellowship of face-to-face conversations with respect and equality. We took part in the yearlong reflections on *Laudato Si'* and followed up
