India's pandemic experience

Covid-19 hit India in January 2020; as the rate of infection grew a total lockdown was declared in the country. Daily wage earners and migrant workers faced multiple hardships: dealing with lost income, food shortages, and lack of transport. Many lost their lives on the highways as families walked days on end to their villages.

India was soon able to ride over the first wave considerably well, but we were not prepared for the ravages of the second wave of Covid. The transition from listening to reports of covid on the news channels to hearing about our inner circle being affected was very aggressive and rapid. We witnessed the most heartrending scenes where people died for want of oxygen and medical facilities. As the situation spiralled out of control,

entire families were wiped out. Hundreds of children became bewildered as they suddenly found themselves orphans. Even more distressing was the dearth of facilities for burying or cremating a dearly beloved one.



However, during this most distressing and hapless situation, God raised amidst us great Samaritans who braved all odds to reach out to their neighbours. Irrespective of religion or caste and creed, people came forward to help in burying the dead; helping people to reach medical aid;

arranging the supply of food and medication to affected families. The intervention of the government with its implementations and restrictions has now curtailed the spread of the infection. However, we still face many challenges. Covid has not only affected the health of people but also the economy of the country and many have lost their jobs: hence we face a severe economic recession. These factors in turn take a toll on the mental health of the people and we have witnessed many voungsters facing depression that leads to suicide.

As we are healing, we grasp the hope that the situation will soon change for the better. Faith in God is the prime strength of our country. Faith, charity, and hope will help us tide over this dreadful period.

Ministry with women and children in violent situations in the Philippines

The Presentation Lay Associates (Parolitas) in Negros Island, Philippines, are mostly connected through the Presentation schools. We are partners with the Sisters in their apostolates, especially in the cause of violence against women and children. In May 2021, some Parolitas provided support to five couples whose marriages had experienced difficulties. The invited couples had been already processed and settled in their local area under the Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC) desk. Having provided activities for their children, our aim was to support each of the couples in a reconciled relationship. During the short





program, the husband and wife were asked to recall memorable experiences, before and after marriage, in a simple question answer segment. This was to determine how well they know each other. A short discussion about the roles of husband and wife was shared. I provided information on domestic disputes and how couples handle different situations. The couples were given the opportunity to freely share their life's struggles. Before the activity ended, the couples were given grocery gift packs and toys for their children, in appreciation for their cooperation. We agreed to

support these families with life skill training and workshops. As we went home, we felt that today's accomplishment will be worth a lifetime to us all.

A Nano moment in Africa - from the USA

The Presentation Sisters always inspired total trust in God. As an Associate in San Antonio, Texas, I desired to experience this trust for myself by working with Sisters in Africa in 2001. Sr. Wiona Engel, the Congregational Leader at the time, connected me with Sr. Sheila Sheehy in Zambia, and I was invited to live with Sr. Mary Brennan in the Chipata Compound, a slum area in Lusaka, to teach English to the





students there. This work certainly fulfilled Nano Nagle's desire for the Sisters to work with the poorest of the poor! While there, I was inspired to set up a class for special needs children living in the compound. Through Sr. Mary's networking with a physical therapist who had visited all the sandstone huts in the compound, she discovered the children with disabilities (cerebral palsy, spina bifida, and mild retardation) were left in the huts and never allowed to go to school. Our challenge was to set up a classroom to accommodate these children so they could have an opportunity to learn. A real "Nano Moment"- an elevated experience - occurred as we watched these precious children come to school with their piece of bread in a small bag and

a big smile. Through the generosity of people Sr. Mary had contacted, we provided them with a hot breakfast of porridge and carpeting to sit on, since several of them were unable to sit at a desk. This ministry continues today.

Mexican Friend of Nano creates Nano portrait



On Christmas Eve, 2020, the anniversary of the founding of the Presentation Sisters, Erandi arrived at our door to present us with a gorgeous portrait she had painted of Nano. Erandi is a 20-year-old *Friend of Nano* and a volunteer at



Presentation Learning Center in Watts, California. She is finishing her second year of college and is a natural-born artist. Erandi is an immigrant from Mexico, currently in the DACA (Deferred Action for Child Arrivals) program. No words can begin to describe the joy her gift brought us. It was in the middle of the worst surge of COVID in Los Angeles, and all was dark around us. Many we know were sick, some had died, and the majority were out of work. To have Nano come into our home on the night of the birth of our Lord, who "pitched his tent among us," and on the anniversary of the founding of the Presentation Sisters was a true grace from God. We heard Nano and Jesus saying, "Don't be afraid. I am with you." Please

remember Erandi and all the other young adults in the United States who are counting on immigration reform.

Community pantry - Philippines



Amidst the COVID-19 crisis, the majority of people in our town have had difficulty meeting their basic needs. Our Community Extension and Outreach/Philanthropic Development Office headed by Mr. Daryl Landrinio, coordinator and a PBVM lay associate, launched a

"Community Pantry Drive". This was a response to the needs of the

community and to demonstrate that we

are all capable of sharing our blessings with our brothers and sisters. Initially, everyone in our institution was encouraged to bring their local produce to our school for sharing. The goods - rice, eggs, vegetables, fruits, canned goods, dried fish, etc. were distributed, mostly by tricycle drivers who took the food to identified areas of need. The donations kept on arriving - some from anonymous donors in kind and as cash. Some even brought homegrown fruit and vegetables to share with the community. The pantry became a


