Our new leadership structure

Where do we come from? This is a question many people ask and our family history is a way of understanding ourselves.

Nano Nagle was a laywoman who lived in the 18th Century during a time when the lives of Irish Catholics were severely restricted by English Penal Laws. Nano, against all odds, became the founder of a religious order now known as Sisters of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (PBVM). The PBVM Order continues to survive and in 2013 Pope Francis declared Nano Nagle 'Venerable'.

Over 60 years ago Pope John XXIII called for Vatican II. This resulted in the Church opening its doors, examining every aspect of Church life and revisiting its liturgy. Two of the decrees, Perfectae Caritatis and Lumen Gentium, recommended religious orders revisit the Charism of their founders and find ways to become more relevant with the times. In the decades that followed, the General Chapter meetings of the Presentation Sisters looked at welcoming lay people as 'Associates'. Guidelines were established for the movement and often the meetings were held in local convents. Over the 40 years of Associates, many lay people have been gifted with Nano's Charism and adopted Nano's model of being of service to others.

In 2009 the Congregational Leadership Team reflected on what it meant to be 'associated' and invited two Associates from each Unit to explore the development of an International Network of Friends of Nano. This took place in Ballygriffin in 2011. After a life-giving gathering, the representatives returned to their home Units to strengthen the Friends of Nano movement or sow the seeds where it didn't exist. A Formation Team continued to summarise the shared wisdom and experiences, and these became our core values. As Associates/Friends of Nano we have endeavoured to give practical expression of these values, in the light of Nano's Charism, through compassion, commitment, courage, confidence, creativity, in communion with other Presentation People.... and all these *impact in our lives* values are underpinned by the practice of contemplation.

and collaborator, she was soon in contact with Unit Coordinators and Link Sisters organising zoom meetings and 'looking' for the way forward. The International Movement has coresponsibility for the PBVM mission and ministers collaboratively alongside the Sisters and other like-minded people. Friends of Nano have responsibility for our communication, formation, the promotion of the movement among new and younger members, and the promotion of leadership.

Increasingly 'Presentation People' is being used as an inclusive term as it encompasses the IPA; **PBVM Union; the Australian Society** and Conference of Presentation Sisters.

We know that significant ministry is happening in every corner of the Presentation world, while also appreciating different cultures and geography can make a difference as to how each task may be accomplished. Our ultimate goal is for the continuation of Nano's mission among the poorest of the poor. Over the past months we have formed three teams to collaborate and support an International Leadership Team:

The **Communication Team** has wide ranging tasks including finding a way everyone can have an equal voice and communicate in a way that is understood by every culture. The five team members come from North India, Philippines, Ireland, England, and South India. A WhatsApp Group has been set up for ease of communication.

The three members of the **Formation Team** are already discovering what resources are available and looking at a number of related tasks including how to meet the International Animator and, being a great communicator needs of new members. The team members come from

Australia, USA, and North India and have also set up a WhatsApp Group.

The Young Members Team come from Africa, Philippines, and South India. Their tasks will involve the schools and focus on sharing Nano's charism, sowing and identifying seeds of faith during what could be a relatively short time of association.

Led by Mary-Ann Greaney, the leaders of these Teams form the International Leadership Team. This exists to support your ministry and

will continue to collaborate with all Unit Sisters and Coordinators as in the past. The various tasks of the Teams are listed on the video (8 mins into the video link provided on front page).

Promotion of Leadership is an important task of all Teams - although we are each responsible for encouraging others to use their leadership qualities. No two leaders are alike and all have their own gifts. We need to identify the time commitment given to a leadership role and by working collaboratively ensure no one is overburdened. Let us pray for good leaders so that we can continue to follow the path of faith Nano began'By degrees with the assistance of God we may do a great deal.'



I loved raising money for Presentation ministries in Chile and Papua New Guinea

I'm almost 91 years old and my memory is not what it used to be, but I have clear recollections of meeting Mother Vianney (RIP), PBVM, in the 1950s in the original convent. I joined the mission circle to support Presentation ministries in Chile and Papua New Guinea. I enjoyed making cards to sell and getting to know other sisters especially Srs Joseph Mary (RIP), Celine Prendergast (RIP), and Breda Ryan. I also baked many loaves to help raise money – they always sold well. On the day of the gala I had the sweet stall and along with Anita (Friend of Nano RIP) received the contributions and packaged them up into small paper bags for sale the

Nano's final Easter

Easter Sunday in 1784 was on April 11. During Holy week Nano read the Passion story three times each day in different schools. On Holy Thursday she kept an eleven hour vigil - all on her knees. It was discovered after her death that her knees were severely ulcerated. Nano and her sisters enjoyed a wonderful Easter Sunday celebration. Just six days later Nano became seriously ill. Ursuline Sister Angela Fitzsimons wrote to Teresa Mulally on 21 May 1784 with a first hand account of Nano's final days.



An inflammation had been long formed in her lungs; a violent cough, great oppression, and total weakness, were the symptoms; but she never once complained, not even of the blister, and had hopes of recovering, ,till about twenty-four hours before her death. On seeing her blood quite corrupted and inflamed, she knew it was impossible; however, she sent money to three of her favourite children to desire them to pray for her recovery, if it was for the glory of God, that she might have more time to prepare for eternity.

The doctors would not permit her to receive the last sacraments 'till about seven hours before she died, lest the application and extraordinary devotion would exhaust her too much, as they still had hopes that God would spare her longer to the poor and distressed, to whom she was a tender mother. She expired about one o'clock on Monday, the 26 April, the sixth day of her illness.

It has been 235 years since Nano died, and her memory and dream lives on in young and old the world over. Take some time to reflect on the ways that you keep Nano's memory alive. How are others doing it? Mary-Ann Greaney, New Zealand
